HOUSE RESOLUTION 713

Offered by Representative Windhorst:

WHEREAS, The Illinois Prevention Network (IPN) is a statewide collaboration of prevention professionals, community coalitions, and organizations committed to creating and sustaining safe, healthy, and drug-free communities by advancing evidence-based strategies that reduce youth substance use, promote mental wellness, and support families across Illinois; and

WHEREAS, National Prevention Week, observed from May 10 through May 16, 2026, is an annual public education campaign sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to raise awareness about the importance of substance use prevention and positive mental health; and

WHEREAS, Community-based coalitions are recognized as an evidence-based, population-level strategy for substance use prevention and behavioral health promotion, leveraging cross-sector collaboration to reduce risk factors and enhance protective factors for youth and families; and

WHEREAS, The Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program, funded by the Office of National Drug Control Policy, administered by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, currently supports 11 coalitions in Illinois that engage youth and adults in developing local solutions to prevent substance use among young people; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Link Together coalition was named coalition of the year by CADCA, which represents and supports over 7,000 community coalitions in every U.S. state and territory and more than 28 countries around the world; and

WHEREAS, Illinois leads the nation in the number of CADCA Blue Ribbon recipients with outstanding coalitions, including the Communities for Positive Youth Development (CPYD) Coalition, the Stand Strong Coalition, the Juvenile Justice Council of Iroquois County, the North Shore Coalition for Drug-Free Communities, the Choose Your Path Coalition, the Braidwood Area Healthy Community Coalition, and the Healthy Communities Alliance; and

WHEREAS, The Pledge for Life coalition was named a Dose of Prevention award first runner-up by CADCA for their effective stop medicine abuse campaign in 2024; and

WHEREAS, These Illinois coalitions serve as models for effective implementation of SAMHSA's Strategic Prevention Framework and demonstrate measurable community-level reductions in youth substance use through inclusive partnerships, youth-led initiatives, and culturally responsive programming; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Youth Survey (IYS), administered biennially by the Center for Prevention Research and Development at the University of Illinois, provides critical data on youth substance use, mental health, and related risk behaviors, enabling communities to tailor prevention strategies; and

WHEREAS, The 2024 IYS data indicates positive trends in reduced youth use of alcohol, tobacco, and prescription drugs, highlighting the effectiveness of ongoing prevention initiatives led by community coalitions, schools, and other local stakeholders; and

WHEREAS, National Prevention Week provides an opportunity to elevate the role of prevention in promoting mental and behavioral wellness, reducing youth substance use, and building stronger, healthier communities across the State of Illinois; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 10 through May 16, 2026 as Prevention Week in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend the leadership and commitment of the many agencies and partners across the State whose work supports prevention coalitions, youth leaders, schools, and families who work tirelessly to create safe and supportive environments through prevention and mental health promotion; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the members of the Illinois Prevention Network, including the Boone County Drug Prevention Coalition, the Braidwood Area Healthy Community Coalition, Catalyst Adlai E. WHEREAS, Louis D. Burrell is a distinguished educator, community developer, civic leader, and advocate whose lifelong service has profoundly shaped the educational, economic, and social fabric of the City of Kankakee; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell dedicated 39 years of exemplary service as a professional educator within the Chicago Public School system, serving with distinction as a history teacher, physical education teacher,

and assistant principal, positively influencing generations of students through academic excellence, leadership development, and character formation; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell, during his tenure with Chicago Public Schools, demonstrated steadfast commitment to professional advocacy and educator leadership, serving as a delegate for the CPS Teachers' Union and a representative for the CPS Teachers' Association, ensuring the voices and rights of educators were represented with integrity and resolve; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell, as a community developer, founded and established Louis D. Burrell Builders, through which he constructed 18 buildings on the north side of Kankakee, creating safe, stable, and affordable housing opportunities that benefited hundreds of residents and strengthened neighborhood vitality; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell, as a civil rights activist, is a proud member of the NAACP, continuing a legacy of advocacy, equity, and justice for underserved communities; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell has demonstrated deep civic engagement through public service, including his role as Kankakee First Ward Committeeman, and through his work as campaign manager for numerous local political leaders, contributing to democratic participation and responsible governance; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell is committed to fellowship, service, and leadership through his membership in the Men of Progress Social Club of Kankakee, the Masonic Lodge of Kankakee, and the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, which he pledged at Purdue University, upholding principles of manhood, scholarship, perseverance, and uplift; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell's greatest legacy, beyond his professional and civic achievements, is his family, where he serves as father of eight, grandfather of 16, great-grandfather of 28, and great-great-grandfather of three, whose lives reflect his values, guidance, and enduring influence; and

WHEREAS, Louis Burrell's life and work exemplify dedication to education, community development, civic leadership, and generational impact; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare February 2, 2026 as "Louis D. Burrell Day" in the State of Illinois in honor of his extraordinary lifetime of contributions and the legacy he continues to build; and be it further

WHEREAS, The Semiquincentennial offers a meaningful opportunity for communities across Illinois to explore local histories, elevate underrepresented voices, and consider how democratic principles can be strengthened for future generations; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That we support efforts to expand access to high-quality civics education that prepares individuals for thoughtful, constructive participation in our democracy with an understanding of the nation's founding ideals and the diverse people and communities in Illinois who have engaged, and continue to engage, in the work required to realize them fully for our residents and all residents of the states and territories of the United States of America.

RESOLVED, That we encourage citizens to observe this designation with appropriate ceremonies, memorial services, moments of silence, educational programs, and acts of community service to honor the legacy of our fallen heroes; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we express our deepest gratitude to the families of the fallen, and we pledge our continued support to the men and women who serve and protect our communities each day.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 722

Offered by Representative Hoffman:

WHEREAS, Major Richard Star was an Iraq and Afghanistan veteran who, after exposure to burn pits during his service, received a diagnosis of lung cancer; and

WHEREAS, Major Richard Star, due to his diagnosis, was forced to retire before completing 20 years of service and was therefore unable to collect his retirement and disability benefits; and

WHEREAS, For every dollar of disability pay they receive, veterans with less than 20 years of service and a disability rating of less than 50 percent will have their retirement pay reduced by a dollar; and

WHEREAS, An estimated 50,000 retired service members are ineligible for concurrent benefits under the current rules; and

WHEREAS, According to the Congressional Budget Office, in 2022, the average offset was approximately \$1,900 a month; and

WHEREAS, The Major Richard Star Act would remove these restrictions and ensure that all service members who have medically retired can receive full access to retirement pay and disability benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Richard Star lost his battle with lung cancer in 2021, and his widow stated that his greatest goal was to get legislation passed providing for the removal of these restrictions; and

WHEREAS, The United States owes these benefits to its veterans regardless of the cost associated with their allocation; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the U.S. Congress to support the Major Richard Star Act to allow medically retired service members to receive full access to their much-deserved retirement and pay benefits; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President of the United States, the U.S. Senate Majority Leader, the U.S. Senate Minority Leader, the U.S. Speaker of the House, the U.S. House of Representatives Minority Leader, and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 723

Offered by Representative Guerrero-Cuellar:

WHEREAS, Serious mental illnesses like bipolar disorder, major depressive disorder, and schizophrenia often require treatment with antipsychotic medications for effective management, and antipsychotic prescribing rates continue to rise; and

WHEREAS, While prolonged antipsychotic use may be essential for the treatment of certain conditions, it is associated with tardive dyskinesia (TD), a condition marked by uncontrollable, abnormal, and repetitive movements of the face, torso, limbs, or extremities; and

WHEREAS, People at higher risk of TD include those older than 55 years, people who are Black, women, individuals with mood or substance use disorders, intellectual disabilities, or central nervous system injuries, and those with high cumulative antipsychotic exposure; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 60% of the estimated 800,000 U.S. adults living with TD remain undiagnosed, and even mild TD symptoms can be stigmatizing and impair physical, social, and emotional well-being, underscoring the urgency of early screening, detection, and intervention; and

WHEREAS, The American Psychiatric Association recommends routine TD screening in their clinical guidelines for antipsychotic treatment, and individuals treated with antipsychotics or experiencing abnormal movements should consult their health care providers to assess TD risk, receive TD screenings, and determine appropriate treatment together; and

WHEREAS, FDA-approved treatments for TD can provide options for symptom management and improved quality of life for many individuals living with TD; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly can encourage TD screening education and awareness for health care providers, patients, and care partners to help ensure patients prescribed antipsychotics receive care and support that aligns with clinical best practices, including regular TD screenings; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 3 through May 9, 2026 as Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week (TDAW) in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support TDAW in recognition of the importance of early detection and intervention to improve outcomes for people living with mental health conditions and prescribed antipsychotics, and we support efforts to raise awareness about the causes and symptoms of tardive

dyskinesia (TD) and the importance of routine TD screening.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 726

Offered by Representative Harper:

WHEREAS, Farming as a family-owned and independent business has been an important part of the social and economic development of Illinois and the United States; and

WHEREAS, Black farmers in America have had a long struggle to own land and operate independently; for more than a century after emancipation and the ratification of the 13th Amendment that abolished slavery, various economic and social barriers were discriminatorily applied toward Black farmers, and the few existing civil rights laws were rarely enforced; and

WHEREAS, Many foundational agricultural techniques used in the United States today were developed or refined through the knowledge and labor of enslaved Africans, who brought with them sophisticated farming traditions from West and Central Africa, including expertise in rice cultivation, crop rotation, seed selection, irrigation, and soil stewardship that helped shape American agricultural systems; and

WHEREAS, Pembroke Township in Kankakee County, founded by self-emancipated formerly enslaved people, developed into one of the largest historic Black rural farming communities in the Northern United States, where generations of Black farmers pursued land ownership and agricultural independence and established a lasting legacy of agricultural stewardship in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In 1920, there were approximately 892 Black farmers in Illinois, and African Americans owned approximately 14% of the nation's farmland; and

WHEREAS, Despite Illinois having nearly 27 million acres of farmland, Black farmers today operate less than 1% of that land, reflecting the long-term decline in Black land ownership and participation in agriculture over the past century; and

WHEREAS, Over the last century, Black land ownership has declined dramatically nationwide, with Black farmers losing an estimated 90% of their farmland since its peak in the early 20th century; and

WHEREAS, According to the United States Department of Agriculture's 2017 Census of Agriculture, Illinois had 188 individually Black-owned farms, covering approximately 40,412 acres, and out of 116,417 agricultural producers statewide, only 267 were Black; and

WHEREAS, According to the 2022 Census of Agriculture, Black producers in Illinois represented well under 1% of all agricultural producers in the State, and Black-operated farmland accounted for less than 1% of the State's nearly 27 million agricultural acres; and

WHEREAS, As farming has become a large-scale, capital-intensive industry, it has become one of the least diverse business sectors in the State, and pressures of consolidation, rising land values, limited access to credit, heirs' property challenges, and inequitable program access have disproportionately reduced the ranks of Black family and independent farmers; and

WHEREAS, In a landmark legal settlement, the United States Department of Agriculture acknowledged decades of discriminatory lending practices toward Black farmers, including delayed loans, denied financing, and inequitable access to federal programs; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has created regulatory frameworks for both industrial hemp and adult-use cannabis cultivation, and the State has expressed a commitment to social equity and the inclusion of communities historically harmed by prohibition; and

WHEREAS, Expanding equitable access to land, capital, and agricultural markets, including emerging specialty crop sectors creates new opportunities for Black farmers and growers to build generational wealth and participate more fully in Illinois' evolving agricultural economy; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has increasingly recognized the importance of expanding opportunities for emerging farmers and socially disadvantaged producers, including those participating in specialty crop sectors such as industrial hemp and cannabis cultivation, as part of a broader effort to build a more equitable and resilient agricultural economy; and

WHEREAS, Black farmers and growers in Illinois today are leading innovation in urban agriculture, specialty crop production, regenerative farming practices, hemp and cannabis cultivation, vertical production systems, and local food distribution networks; in Chicago alone, more than 800 community gardens and urban farms operate across the city, with many being stewarded by Black growers and

community organizations working to strengthen local food systems and improve food access in underserved communities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 3 through May 9, 2026 as Black Farmers and Growers Week in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the people of Illinois and their representatives in government to learn about the history of Black farming communities and the contributions made by African Americans to agriculture in the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we further encourage State agencies and policymakers to ensure that agricultural programs intended to support farmers are implemented in a manner that meaningfully reaches Black farmers and growers across Illinois, including emerging, limited-resource, and socially disadvantaged producers, and that outreach and program participation extend broadly throughout the State's Black farming communities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Governor of the State of Illinois, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Illinois, the Director of the Illinois Department of Agriculture, the National Black Farmers Association, and the National Black Food & Justice Alliance.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 727

Offered by Representative Canty:

WHEREAS, The future of our nation's productivity and competitiveness in the global marketplace depends on the success of all men and women; and

WHEREAS, Women have been discriminated against in education, the workplace, and society as a whole; and

WHEREAS, Equal Pay Day, started by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996, was created with the goal of raising awareness about the gender wage gap; this symbolic day further highlights and combats the impact of pay inequities through U.S. Census data, which has revealed that women working full-time and year-round are paid 81% of what men are paid, and all workers, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 76% of what men are paid; and

WHEREAS, In 2022, changes were made to the methodology, and The Equal Pay Day Calendar now encompasses a broader cross-section of women, including those who work part-time or seasonally, to represent a more accurate picture of how the gender pay gap impacts diverse communities; the COVID-19 pandemic pushed many women, especially women of color, into part-time or seasonal work or out of the workforce all together; because of this, past methods of calculating the wage gap fell short of accurately capturing the full picture; with the new inclusive methodology, we can advocate on behalf of all women in the workforce; and

WHEREAS, Because the pay gap varies significantly among different communities, other Equal Pay Days have been added to the calendar over the years to reflect the fact that many women must work far longer into the year to catch up to men; and

WHEREAS, Equal Pay Day, which represents all women, is to be celebrated on March 26 this year; and

WHEREAS, Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Women's Equal Pay Day is April 7 this year; AANHPI women working full-time and year-round are paid 95 cents, and all earners, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 83 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men; and

WHEREAS, LGBTQIA+ Equal Pay Awareness Day is June 17 this year; this day raises awareness about the wage gap experienced by the LGBTQIA+ community; and

WHEREAS, Black Women's Equal Pay Day is July 21 this year; Black women working full-time and year-round are paid 65 cents, and all earners, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 63 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men; and

WHEREAS, Moms' Equal Pay Day is August 6 this year; mothers working full-time and year-round are paid 74 cents, and all earners, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 64 cents for every dollar paid to fathers; and

WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (NHPI) Women's Equal Pay Day is September 15 this year; NHPI women working full-time and year-round are paid 67 cents, and all earners, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 59 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men; and

WHEREAS, Latina Equal Pay Day is October 8 this year; Latinas working full-time and year-round are paid 58 cents, and all earners, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 54 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men; and

WHEREAS, Disabled Women's Equal Pay Day is October 20 this year; disabled women working full-time and year-round are paid 68 cents, and all earners, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 56 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men; and

WHEREAS, Native Women's Equal Pay Day is November 19 this year; Native women working full-time and year-round are paid 58 cents, and all earners, including part-time and seasonal, are paid 53 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men; and

WHEREAS, The pay gap has been shown to start as soon as one year after college, and this inequality affects not only women but also their families and society as a whole; and

WHEREAS, The pay gap between women and men has long-term effects on women's economic security, and such a gap affects women's Social Security earnings, their ability to save for retirement, and their children's education; and

WHEREAS, Pay equity is closely linked to the eradication of poverty and is essential to having a highly-motivated workforce; and

WHEREAS, Equal pay is a priority for all women and for our society at large; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March 26, 2026 as Equal Pay Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the citizens of this State to learn about the pay gap that women experience in society and to learn about these various dates that bring attention to the pay gap that specific groups experience.
