SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 749

WHEREAS, Illinois is the fourth-largest pork producer in the United States, contributing an estimated \$13.8 billion to the State's economy and supporting over 57,000 jobs; and

WHEREAS, Pork is the most widely eaten protein in the world, and consumers have a variety of delicious cuts as choices, including bacon; and

WHEREAS, Bacon is a hot commodity and is not just eaten for breakfast anymore, although it is eaten with eggs 71% of the time; and

WHEREAS, Each year, the average American eats 18 pounds of bacon, and Illinois pig farmers produce over six billion slices of it; and

WHEREAS, Bacon has high amounts of vitamin B3, also called niacin, which is colloquially known as the fountain of youth; and

WHEREAS, Oscar Mayer patented the bacon slice in 1924; and

WHEREAS, Some refer to bacon as the "meat candy", as incorporating it into sweet treats adds a savory and salty element to traditional desserts; the smoky, rich flavor of bacon complements a variety of sweet ingredients, as in the popular candied bacon dessert, which typically involves coating strips of bacon in a mixture of brown sugar, maple syrup, and spices, such as black pepper or cayenne pepper, then baking until the sugar forms a crispy, caramelized coating; and

WHEREAS, The hardworking pig farmers who raise this high-quality product deserve our support; whether plain or applewood smoked, store-bought or artisan-made, bacon is a meat for any meal; and

WHEREAS, The phrase "Bacon Never Broke My Heart" goes without saying; and

WHEREAS, National Bacon Day is celebrated in December, but Illinois needs its own day to pay tribute to this decadent, rich, and indulgent meat; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 6, 2026 as Illinois Bacon Day in the State of Illinois and invite all Illinoisans to thank a pig farmer by enjoying some delicious slices of bacon; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Illinois Pork Producers Association as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

The following amendment was offered in the Committee on Health and Human Services, adopted and ordered printed:

AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO HOUSE BILL 5574

AMENDMENT NO. 1. Amend House Bill 5574 by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the following:

"Section 5. The Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly Act is amended by adding Sections 18 and 22 as follows:

(320 ILCS 40/18 new)

Sec. 18. Outreach and public education.

(a) The Department, in consultation with the Department on Aging and contracted PACE organizations, shall develop and maintain comprehensive, high-quality educational and outreach materials designed to inform eligible persons, their families, and caregivers about the PACE program.

(b) The materials required under subsection (a) shall be produced in a professional, easy-to-read, and visually engaging format. At a minimum, these materials shall:

(1) explain the integrated, interdisciplinary model of care provided by PACE;

(2) detail the eligibility requirements and the voluntary enrollment process;

(3) outline the specific benefits, including medical, social, and long-term care services; and

(4) provide contact information for all active PACE organizations in the State.

(c) The Department shall ensure these materials are available in both printed and electronic formats and are translated into the 3 most commonly spoken languages in the State other than English.

(d) The Department shall distribute these materials to Area Agencies on Aging, local health departments, and hospitals in PACE covered service areas, and shall require each contracted PACE organization to maintain a supply for public distribution.

(320 ILCS 40/22 new)

Sec. 22. PACE Advisory Board.

(a) The Director of Healthcare and Family Services shall appoint a PACE Advisory Board to consult with the Department on the administration of this Act.

(b) The Advisory Board shall be composed of the following persons:

(1) the Director of Healthcare and Family Services, or his or her designee, who shall serve as chairperson;

(2) one representative each of the Department on Aging and the Department of Human Services;

(3) three members who shall be selected from the recommendations of a statewide organization representing PACE providers;

(4) two members who represent the general public and who have no responsibility for management or formation of policy or financial interest in a PACE organization;

(5) one member who is a PACE participant or a participant's legal guardian; and

(6) one member who shall be selected from the recommendations of Illinois consumer organizations that engage in advocacy on behalf of the elderly.

(c) The Advisory Board shall meet as frequently as the chairperson deems necessary, but not less than 4 times each year. Upon request by 4 or more members, the chairperson shall call a meeting of the Advisory Board.

(d) The Advisory Board shall advise the Department on all aspects of its responsibilities under this Act, including, but not limited to, the format and content of any rules adopted by the Department and the development of capitation rate methodologies. During its review of rules or rate methodologies, the Advisory Board shall analyze the economic and regulatory impact of those actions on the sustainability of PACE organizations and the quality of care provided to participants."
